What's an IRM?

"IRM" stands for Individually Registered Member.

Meeting in troops is one way to be part of the Girl Scout experience, but when there aren't available troops in the area, a troop no longer meets, or a girl becomes too busy with extracurricular activities or sports, becoming an IRM will allow her to continue her Girl Scout experience on an individual basis. Girls in any grade (kindergarten through 12th) can be an IRM where she will discover a world of opportunities through Girl Scouts - Louisiana Pines to the Gulf.





IRMs have the power to build their very own Girl Scout experience by completing Journeys, earning badges and attending council and service unit programs that appeal to their interests. They can also participate in the Girl Scout tradition of community service through take action projects and earning the highest awards. Plus, all of these progressive, exceptional experiences can be funded by participating in our annual Fall Sweets and Treats and Girl Scout Cookie programs.

When you unleash your inner G.I.R.L., you can accomplish anything!

GSLearn

gsLearn is Girl Scouts' official online and on-demand training forum. It empowers users ("learners") to complete training as it works best for them. Learners have access to Girl Scout-specific content that supports accuracy and consistency across the Girl Scout Movement, along with "general knowledge" courses provided by our vendor, Litmos.




As a Cadette, she might:

Sweets, Treats, and Girl Scout Cookies





Life as a Girl Scout Family

Hey, Girl Scout Parents! You and your daughter can become partners in the fun challenges of the Girl Scout program! Your involvement will help shape your Girl Scout's experience. She'll see your commitment to her growth and before you know it, you'll be growing, too!

The IRM Network is a girl-led, family-driven Girl Scout experience. As a Parent or Guardian of a Girl Scout IRM, you are her first resource to stay engaged. To support her Girl Scout experience, you must:

- Sign the girl membership form and pay the \$25 annual national membership dues.
- Sign parent/guardian permission slips for events, and make sure any necessary forms (health history, photo releases, etc.) are turned in.
- See that your daughter arrives and is picked up on time at Girl Scout activities.
- Purchase or obtain handbooks and materials.
- Help your daughter carry through with her commitment to the Girl Scout program.
- Help your daughter participate in the Girl Scout Product Programs by following safety guidelines, completing training, and helping her check over her orders.
